- If you fail a **required class** for graduation, you MUST make up the course in Credit Recovery or Summer School
 - See your counselor ASAP if you need to make up a required course

- □ Be a U.S. citizen or Green Card holder.
- \Box Be in good health.
- □ Be 17 to 40 years old (different branches have different age requirements)
- □ Have a high school diploma
- □ Pass the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test.

The ASVAB is offered each fall and spring at Billings Senior High School- stayed tuned for the fall ASVAB date!

Taking the ASVAB does not mean that you will be joining the military, but is an opportunity for students to identify potential career paths.

- □ Wednesday, October 16th, 2019
- □ Arrive before 7:45 am
- □ Bring a pencil and a calculator that follows the calculator policy listed below

Calculator Policy:

- □ A calculator may be used on the math section of the PSAT
- □ It is the student's responsibility to bring an approved calculator. Extra calculators will NOT be available during the test.

- \Box Fee: \$18.00 cash or check
- □ No late registrations will be accepted.

Reasons to Take the PSAT:

- □ Preparation for the SAT that is used for college admissions requirements
- □ To receive feedback on strengths/weaknesses on skills necessary for college
- □ To see how your performance on an admissions test might compare to other students applying to college
- □ To help prepare for the SAT and become familiar with the types of questions they may ask

Taking the ACT

- Every Junior will take the ACT during the day at Senior High on **Tuesday, March 24th, 2020**.
- □ This test will be given for free and during the school day. There is no need to register.
- □ On test day, you will need to bring a photo ID, calculator, and number 2 pencils.

Retaking the ACT

- Select the test date you wish to take the ACT
- \Box Pay the fee to take the ACT online
- □ Upload a photo ID onto the ACT website

Taking the SAT

- Sign in to your free College Board account.
- □ Provide your full, legal name and other identifying information. Make sure it's the exact same name and information shown on your photo ID.
- Decide whether to sign up for the SAT with Essay. See which colleges recommend or require it.
- □ Upload a photo that meets very specific photo requirements.
- □ Check out, and print your Admission Ticket.

- **4 years** of English
- **3 years** of math (Algebra 1 or higher)
- **2** years of natural/physical science
- **1** additional year of English, math or natural/physical science
- **2 years** of social science
- □ 4 additional years of English, math, natural/physical science, social science, foreign language, comparative religion or philosophy
- □ Complete 10 core courses, including seven in English, math or natural/physical science, before your seventh semester. Once you begin your seventh semester, you may not repeat or replace any of those 10 courses to improve your core-course GPA.
- Earn at least a <u>2.3 GPA</u> in your core courses.
